<b>PROJECT DESCRIPTION</b>	Richmond Workforce Development Board’s project will provide earn and learn opportunities for dislocated youth workers through paid work experience and apprenticeships in occupations with career pathways. The project will enable participants to obtain good-paying jobs to support themselves as they gain new experiences and become more competitive in the job market. The program will provide participants with individualized case management designed to identify strengths and needs and connect youth to critical services that will support their success in training and employment. The youth will enroll in the Literacy for Every Adult Program and West Contra Costa Adult Education to improve basic skills, English fluency and attain a high school diploma or a general education diploma (GED) if applicable. Youth who demonstrate aptitude and interest will enroll in Contra Costa College, where they can pursue certificates or degree-based training. Also, youth will receive supportive services such as transportation, childcare, clothes for

interviews/work, assistance obtaining a driver's license, and other services as needed.

**EXPECTED  
OUTCOMES**

The provision of opportunities for paid work experience and apprenticeship will give young people the job experience they need to be more competitive and increase their likelihood of obtaining employment. All of the training opportunities available through the project are in industry sectors and occupations that are well paid and include a career pathway to increase levels of skill, responsibility, and compensation for dislocated youth.

<b>TARGETED PARTICIPANTS</b>	OSY ages 18-24 who are not in school or working. Target groups will include youth with the highest disconnection rates, especially the populations that have been severely impacted by the 2019 novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic and have experienced extended periods of unemployment.

<b>PROJECT DESCRIPTION</b>	The San Diego Workforce Partnership (SDWP) has adopted Human-Centered Design concepts to keep youth at the core of program design. The SDWP's funded subrecipients (program partners) embrace human-centered design and aim to deeply understand the youth they serve and create innovative solutions to meet their needs, reach their goals, and create positive life experiences. Train Upwards will provide an innovative approach to training that addresses disconnected youth worker barriers with a high-engagement soft-skills and work-readiness training, followed by specific occupational skills training that targets OSY ages 18-24. All youth in the Train Upwards project will enroll in training, and the outcomes tracked to determine the efficacy of the two-tiered approach, which will be analyzed and reported by 2023.
<b>EXPECTED OUTCOMES</b>	The SDWP will expand and replicate the pilot program throughout the entire WIOA Youth network beyond the 50 participants in Train Upwards

and include the framework in current and future requests for proposals. The Train Upwards project will allow the SDWP to increase enrollment in the “Training and Employment” WIOA Track that will designate funds for youth in industry-specific training, contracted education training, on-the-job training, individual training accounts, and apprenticeships. This project promotes work-based learning (WBL) opportunities for priority populations in in-demand industries and provide youth with the option to enroll in training and take advantage of earn and learn opportunities.

<b>PROJECT DESCRIPTION</b>	The Hire Youth Ventura County program will build a coalition of companies in Ventura County dedicated to hiring and rapidly re-skilling dislocated youth workers. Through this coalition, employers will recruit eligible participants for this program; build knowledge of industries and occupations; help dislocated youth workers rapidly re-skill and gain experience; establish credibility; access employer networks; effect change for dislocated youth workers; and generate resources for future skilled employees.
<b>EXPECTED OUTCOMES</b>	The Hire Youth Ventura County program will enroll and serve 100 youth. Dislocated youth workers will have the opportunity to learn about in-demand occupations through employer visits, job shadowing, and paid work experience. The Hire Youth Ventura County program will work with employers in the coalition to place dislocated youth in upwardly mobile jobs and employ Ventura County's dislocated youth workforce.
